

Serving in Hope

Putting Love of the poor into action

This year, the whole Vincentian Family, worldwide, is celebrating the 400th Anniversary of Vincentian Spirituality and our Charism. For 400 years the followers of Vincent de Paul, the members of the Vincentian Family, have dedicated themselves to service on behalf of the



less fortunate members of society, taking to heart Vincent's exhortation to see the face of Christ in the poor. Since 1833, our Society has followed this example of service to the poor. "the blessing of the poor is the blessing of God. Let us do what Our Lord Jesus Christ did in the Gospels: *let us go to the poor*".

Since the earliest times, the poor; the sick; the weak and the vulnerable have been side-lined to the peripheries of our communities. Their voices go unheard and their presence is unwelcome. Yet, the Gospel is very clear how we should treat these marginalised. Jesus tells us that we should feed, clothe, visit, love and welcome those pushed to the edges and forgotten. There is much scope for enrichment in our Vincentian work; sharing our food, clothes, furniture, friendship and financial resources can become an encounter in which both parties benefit. The poor receive friendship and practical help and we receive the blessing of the poor. In this way, we can fulfil Pope Francis' intention and be "evangelised by the poor." The poor have much to teach us and we have much to learn from them.

Our Catholic Social Teaching lays great emphasis on the dignity of the human person, and we, Vincentians, above all people should be mindful of this. In our encounters with the poor, there must be a sense of friendship, family, community, respect, mutual solidarity and involvement. As Nelson Mandela said, "What you do for me, without me, you do against me".

The work done by the Society, here in Scotland over the last year, is truly impressive and inspirational. Thank you! However, the future challenges we face will most certainly increase, and we must be prepared to address them. As Frederic reminds us; "Charity should never look behind but always in front, because the number of good deeds which we have done in the past is very small, while the present needs and future needs, which must be relieved, are always endless...." We must never be the priest or Levite, passing by on the other side, but always the good Samaritan, acting quickly and selflessly. In this 400th Anniversary year, let us be a Society of Hope, looking eagerly forward to the future and the service of the poor.

How do you measure a year?

Every day, members of the SSVP give their time, energy and love to help people who are vulnerable and in need. They may need practical support in the form of food, clothing or furniture, or they may need help to attend Mass or access social opportunities, perhaps due to disability. However, and equally as important, people may simply welcome the hand of friendship and have someone spend time with them. These people are visited wherever they are—in their homes, hospitals or in prison for example. In fact, members regularly visit prisoners in Shotts, Barlinnie and Perth working closely with chaplaincies and visitors centres.

In this year celebrating the 400th anniversary year of the Vincentian ethos, the theme for the Vincentian Family is 'Welcome the Stranger'. Conferences have continued and developed their work in reaching out to people who have come to our country in search of safety from places such as Syria.

Working together in 'Conferences', members respond to peoples' needs in the best way that they can. This translates to tons of food being given out and thousands of hours being spent in companionship with people in need.

I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me.

Council of Scotland News

The National Council of Scotland is made up of Arch/Diocesan Presidents from across 7 Dioceses. They are elected by members from their Diocese. The National President leads the Council and is elected by its members. The National President then appoints a secretary, treasurer, Vice President and Twinning Officer. They meet 6 times per year.

In 2017, Dioceses are also organising special Masses to commemorate the 400th anniversary of Vincentian spirituality and charism.

Members from across the country came together for the 2nd annual Mass, in Consecration to the Sacred Heart. The Mass, which was celebrated in the beautiful surroundings of the Gillis Centre in Edinburgh, was celebrated once again by Archbishop Leo Cushley.

Dementia Project

Inspired by Luke 14:1. 12-14, St. Mirin's Conference resolved to offer regular social lunches for parishioners living with dementia together with family members or carers. Jericho Rehabilitation Units "Anything is possible"

Facing up to addiction problems can be a tough and frightening decision to make however it is also a very brave and courageous step to take. When girls come into Jericho House they are mostly in poor physical, emotional and spiritual condition; most have caused great damage to their bodies and family relations have broken down.

fun again. Drama plays a huge part in the recovery process of Jericho, girls participate in weekly drama rehearsals which lead onto a production performed on stage in front of a huge audience including family, friends and the public.

As well as the plays being fun it also enables the girls to work through self-esteem, confidence and lack of belief in themselves.

"I love taking part in drama, the feeling I get on the night of the performance is better than any drug I have ever taken". Service User

Jericho girls have thus far put on two full productions and taken part in a joint X Factor Christmas show with the boy's house.

"After my first performance on stage I felt really emotional and proud that I had finally done something my family were proud of, my children loved seeing their mummy on stage".

There are no pre-written scripts for the plays; the girls draw on their own personal experience of addiction to come up with the characters and scenes, humour and fun are added. However they also have a very strong, emotional and powerful positive message showing that you can overcome addiction and become whatever your heart desires.... Anything is possible.

Sister Rosalie Rendu SWC (Ozanam Club) "Working in Partnership"

Renfrewshire Council's Autism Connections Team made contact through the national office and delivered an hour long session. A member of the council's team provided a brief insight into some of the ways autism can affect people and we found ourselves able to identify the traits displayed by some of our members. The team went on to explain how we could help to increase our friend's enjoyment of the Club by just being more aware of what might adversely affect them and to minimise the effect. We continue to be blessed with the gift of enthusiastic young people, each year we get between 15 and 20 new volunteers from S5/S6 in Trinity High and St. Andrew's Academy and many continue to volunteer long after they have left school.

Diocese of Galloway

St Joseph's Conference, Kilmarnock have initiated a Mini Vinnie Group, one of only two parish based groups in Scotland. The group works closely with Alistair Thomson, Conference President, and other Conference members, helping those in their local community who are in need. Recently, in July, the group organised a food collection which received over 1400 items of food and raised £260. The food was distributed by Conference members.` Conference Spiritual Adviser, Fr. Stephen McGrattan said " the Mini Vinnies are a way to encourage young people to think about the mission of St Vincent de Paul, to look for needs in the community, and to come up with their own ideas to reach out and help others."

Conference members regularly visit patients in the local hospice. The Conference donated many books for the library.



International News

Vincentian Family Global Initiative on Homelessness

June 28, 2017 marked the official announcement of the Famvin Homeless Alliance, an initiative of the Worldwide Vincentian Family to reduce and wherever possible, eliminate homelessness in its multiple forms. This ceremony took place at the European Parliament, by invitation of its president, Antonio Tajani, who wished to honour the work of the followers of St. Vincent de Paul with the people living in poverty, especially with the homeless.

In harmony with the global definition of homeless developed by the Institute of Global Homelessness (IGH), the attitude and actions of welcoming the homeless include action with and in favour of people living in the streets, refugees and internally displaced people and slum-dwellers. The urgency of this issue is evident: The most recent UN reports on this topic suggests that, of the 7 billion people on this planet, more than 1.2 billion fall within this IGH three-tiered definition of global homelessness. It is one of the great social ills of our time.

The Vincentian Family at the UN

Representatives of the Vincentian Family at the United Nations in Geneva (Daughters of Charity and Society of Saint Vincent de Paul) took part in the 34th session of the Human Rights Council in March 2017. The session focused particularly on the situation in Syria, and renewed the mandate of the international commission of enquiry on fighting impunity. The main task of the representatives of the Vincentian Family in these international bodies is to attend meetings, providing a link and working closely with United Nations



representatives. As we know, through its work the Vincentian Family endeavours to respond to many of the objectives it shares with the United Nations: to eradicate poverty throughout the world, protect the dignity of suffering people, promote peace and justice in the world and make the voice of the poor heard at an international level. Through its presence at the United Nations, the Vincentian Family tries to achieve these objectives.
