The National President leads the Council and is elected by its Members. The National President may then appoint additional office bearers. They meet six times per year.

National Office - Serving the administrative, financial and youth aspects of the national charity, the office team includes staff Margaret Thomson, Pauline Bonnar, and Jaqueline Laird and volunteers.

SSVP Scotland is part of the worldwide Vincentian family. SSVP is an associate member of UNESCO and a special adviser to the UN Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC). It is also part of the Global Catholic Climate Movement and is aligned with the 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) proposed by the United Nations in its Agenda 2030.

COVID created new methods of working for the archdiocese of Glasgow over the last year.

Conference personal visits ended with the social restrictions. Instead, they resorted to telephone calls and zoom meetings to keep in touch with parishioners as well as each other.
Over the year many Conferences simply remained closed.
Bank balances for some Conferences did not change from the previous year as incomes were impacted by the closure of churches.

However, as Members grew accustomed to the new way of living,

Conferences began to find ways to still reach people in need. Door stepping became a feature; supporting local food banks and stewarding at Masses were all possible for our non-shielding Members. This thinking outside the box attitude really helped members feel

that they could persevere through this difficult time.

The Ozanam Centre for the homeless in the centre of Glasgow was forced to close because of COVID but has since had limited reopening.

The Ozanam Scholarship Fund, which supports students otherwise unable to afford University in the Archdiocese, continued to operate and this year 2020/21 a further eight students were chosen for support.

The year ahead will see new challenges being presented. The recruitment programme will restart as soon as it is safe to do so. Hopefully new members will join and support the work of SSVP Scotland, as we seek opportunities to serve those in need.

# Home Learning Initiative St Edward's Airdrie During

the 2020 - 2021 lockdown period the Conference identified a strong need within the parish & local partner schools for assistance in accessing quality materials to support learning at home. It was found that many pupils within the parish & school communities were having difficulty in sourcing materials such as jotters, pens, or pencils and were suffering hardship and falling behind because of this.

The Conference therefore arranged to secure a large quantity of relevant supplies and formed over 100 learning packs (each comprising various suitable equipment and resources) which were in turn distributed to pupils from four partner schools. This enabled all children in need of such equipment to continue their studies at this most difficult time and allowed the Conference to continue to support the most vulnerable



members of their community in a new & innovative way.



New Management Team Revitalise Motherwell Furniture Project
The Furniture project in Wishaw is thriving due to the successful installation of a new Management Team. They have recruited a dedicated team of volunteers, both

offices based and on the road. They currently have 5 Drivers, 2 Drivers/
Assistants and 9 Office staff who give their time freely to enable the Unit to perform efficiently.

Reconciliation and Holy Communion. SSVP interaction with our young Catholics at these spiritual landmarks provides experience of role models of faith and examples of Vincentian values in action. It also strengthens the bond between Conference, school, and parish.

SSVP Galloway Diocesan Council, working in collaboration with Faith in Community Scotland were invited to identify a local project to benefit from funding. Our Lady & St Cuthbert's Conference, Maybole which had

links with local Project – The Carrick Foods Garden Projects (CFGP) was the perfect candidate. The CFGP is a fruit and vegetable garden in Maybole established in November 2019 to help food bank users and others with long-term issues to improve their physical and mental wellbeing.

The Parish Priest, also an enthusiastic supporter of the project, offered a plot of land located on the parish church property at Our Lady & St Cuthbert's, Maybole. While the pandemic



significantly disrupted plans, work was able to start in August 2020. The first job was to clear the



plot which had become overgrown as well as being used as a dumping ground. Working in partnership with a young team from South Ayrshire Council's Employability and Skills initiative, and with great local support, the team were able to start building raised beds ready to plant their first crop in March 2021.

The project has been an outstanding example of community collaboration. Sadly, the SSVP Conference has since closed, however the fruit of their labours continues to grow.

Christ the King Conference, Howood recently assisted a young refugee who had broken his ankle. On visiting, they found he was desperately short of any home comforts. They supplied him with some essential items for which he was very grateful. He took the time to find out the furniture project phone number to thank them for their help.

Holy Spirit Special Works Conference (HSSWC) supports the work of the Jericho Drug Rehabilitation Unit. Jericho provides 28 places for men and women in two separate houses. Over the last few years, Jericho experienced serious financial difficulties and there was danger of its closing.

HSSWC have provided some essential items for the two houses which have recently included freezer, beds, and furniture. They continue to support and maintain two minibuses which although reduced in usage during the pandemic, allow the residents to leave the houses for essential trips. Usually, the main

function of the busses is to transport residents to vital Narcotics Anonymous meetings.

Seven diocesan Conferences have continued to support the pre-COVID request for a contribution to a monthly fuel account. HSSWC are very grateful for this as it allows the minibus to be available when required.



St Patrick's Greenock have been teaming up with the other local Conferences during lockdown to ensure no one in need is left behind. They have also used the time to get to know other charity and care

organisations in the area which will be useful in the future to pass the information on to those who seek assistance.

# St James and St Matthew's Kinross/Auchtermuchty,

assisted a woman with a young family who had been allocated a new house but there was little or no floor covering. By looking at roll ends they were able to get the whole house fitted with brand new carpets at low cost. Unknown to them, the day it was fitted was in

fact her birthday. It was not until the job was done, she said, "Thank you so very much. Today is my birthday and this is the best birthday present I have ever had." She and her young family now have a comfortable home.

Another lady required a new mattress and bed which was

provided for her. She said, "That is fantastic, the bed is amazing! I am so happy."

A gentleman who received help from the Conference said "Thank you so very much. I can't believe people are so good."

#### At St Stephen's Blairgowrie,

co-operation has been key. They were asked by Social Work to help a local family by providing £100. £50 was for proper fitting clothes for their young child, and £50 for gas vouchers to help the parents out of a monthly "debt cycle" of repaying loans to other family members. The parents were both on benefit and repaying a crisis loan. This help was

gratefully received by Social Work and the family.

A local Primary School Headteacher requested help for a mother with two daughters who had moved into the area from a difficult situation. They were provided with money to help them over the Christmas period. This made a huge difference to the family and the mother was very grateful for SSVP Scotland support.

Whatever the need, and there are many, SSVP Members are always grateful for the opportunity to serve.

safely in the pram.



Nationally SSVP Scotland played an important role in enabling people to become digitally connected by providing free iPads with 24 months internet connectivity plus support to develop digital skills, through the Scottish Government's initiative 'Connecting Digitally'. The devices were available for two separate groups of beneficiaries. 1) Older people / or people with disabilities and 2) Families with children. Applications by SSVP Scotland were made for both streams for each of the 27 Local Authority areas with SSVP Conferences.

In total of 231 free devices were awarded to SSVP Scotland to distribute. Of the 231 devices awarded a total 207 iPads and 200 MiFi devices were distributed. Around 20 members undertook training to be Digital Champions.

There were challenges along the way, however feedback from beneficiaries was very positive and overall, it was an extremely worthwhile exercise which demonstrated SSVP Scotland's commitment to the changing needs of those we serve. Assisting older people to access digital devices can significantly reduce the poverty of loneliness. Many of those in receipt said they were happy to now be able to stay in better touch with their wider families. and friends.

So this particular honour Today I send to you For volunteering your time In the way you choose to do.




