I would encourage all Conferences to make a special effort this year to bring the Society of St. Vincent de Paul Scotland's members together to celebrate and I am looking forward to seeing many brothers and sisters on that occasion.

AROUND THE CONFERENCES

Aberdeen Diocese

Conferences which have not met since the first lockdown, are now reconnecting. Conferences adapt their service depending on local needs and local resources. Most Conferences working within Parishes are visiting the sick and elderly in their homes, which continues to be a significant need and offers good support. Some Conferences, continue to benefit from produce from CFINE (Community Food Initiatives North East) for the food parcels they hand out. This includes fresh food, tinned food, and food near its best before date. Other Conferences are giving aid to The Apostleship of the Sea mainly in the form of sweets and warm clothing.

An ongoing concern has been the needs and care for Ukrainian Refugees. It was reported that the local agencies; Local Councils, Housing and Social Work, Health Facilities and Education are carrying out their duties so efficiently that there had been limited request for help in the area. This is reassuring that the agencies are meeting the needs of the vulnerable citizens.

St Andrews & Edinburgh Archdiocese

The last few months have been about working to strengthen our structure within St Andrews & Edinburgh SSVP and understand the issues, challenges our Conferences are facing.

Tom Canning (Fife) Thomas Harkins (West Lothian) and Richard Zak (Stirlingshire) have recently all joined Bobby Murdoch (Edinburgh) as our Group Presidents. A massive welcome to them and a request for your prayers in helping us all to continue help serving the poor in our Archdiocese and beyond.

A particular recent success across the Archdiocese has been the number of Conferences that have set up and supported "warm room" initiatives. The Furniture Project continues to support the Diocesan needs and has reached out to welcome refugee families from Ukraine, Syria, Afghanistan, Angola, and a number of other countries.

Dunkeld Diocese

SSVP is probably one of the best kept secrets and while we do not boast about our work many people have no idea of what we do, so it important that we let them know how we might be able to help. A number of Conferences in the city of Dundee who are working with a number of families from India and Afghanistan. They have helped them with housing, clothing, furniture and even helped them to find work in the city. Throughout the year Conferences across the Diocese of Dunkeld have raised funds for and continue to support refugees from Ukraine. Most Conferences work in conjunction with other help groups and there is always a range of cross referrals, with SSVP referring clients to other specialist groups and SSVP receiving referrals from these groups and often Social Services.

Energy Support Scheme - Over the winter months the combined Conferences of St John the Baptist/St Mary Magdalene, Perth have been operating a scheme to help vulnerable families cope with the steep rises in the price of gas/electricity. In collaboration with Perth & Kinross Foodbank, we are issuing vouchers to vulnerable families who use the foodbank services. Each voucher is worth £30 and can be redeemed at a local Co-op store, the cost being met by our Conferences. The scheme will last until the end of April 2023, but can be extended, depending on need.

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Galloway Diocese

Motherwell Diocese

Sacred Heart, Bellshill & St Gerard's, Bellshill SSVP:

The Senior Citizens' Christmas Social Evening was a great success with a large number of Parishioners attending. As always everyone enjoyed the night. Sacred Heart were successful in receiving a grant towards the Social Evening. St Gerard's was also successful in receiving a grant of £3,150 from CORRA Foundation, this will go to help those in most need during this difficult period. We continue to work together to assist the Community.

MW Furniture Project Update

The Project has continued to thrive, and the generosity of the public encourages us try and maintain what we do. To date (02/2023) we have delivered to 110 households with a range of furnishings to enable families to provide a better home. We have also carried out 80 Uplifts including complete house clearances. Earlier on this year we were graced with the presence of 3 Students from Valladolid College, the young men were extremely interested in our charitable work, and thoroughly enjoyed the time they had with us.



What we desperately need is additional Volunteers to help in the office with completing request forms for answering telephone enquiries, 4 hrs a week and Volunteers to assist with the delivery and uplift service, additional drivers would be most welcome. For many years the Conference at St Peter's Partick, Glasgow supported a soup kitchen in the city centre. However, as a result of the covid pandemic the need lessened due to many secular groups now providing a similar service.

The soup kitchen's key coordinator was aware of a substantial need for many people living in the high-rise flats in Lincoln Ave, Knightswood, Glasgow. The Lincoln flats complex comprises four tower blocks, nineteen stories high with six apartments on each floor. Some live in what is termed a temporary flat i.e. they could be moved on at short notice. Others have a permanent lease. In total approximately 1500 people live in this complex. Residents include families, many of whom are asylum seekers and refugees, as well as individuals blighted with drug or alcohol issues. Poor mental health is all too common.

This knowledge, along with a reduction in calls for assistance at parish houses gave St. Peter's SSVP and the other Conferences in the Glasgow North Group (Glasgow NG) the impetus to go where the need is, rather than wait for people to come to us. This desire to help people within their own community led to the concept of a community kitchen rather than simply a soup kitchen being developed. This led to establishing the "Lincoln Community Kitchen".

The groundwork to getting started involved meetings with the various interested parties to achieve consensus and to reach the necessary agreements. Once all parties were satisfied, permission was given for the Lincoln Community Kitchen to operate from a customised sea freight container at the base of the flats, provided free by LINKES. Thus, on a freezing Wednesday evening on 13 December 2022, with a temperature of around minus 7°, our service began and runs weekly from 5pm – 8pm. We offer a free 'take away' food service of homemade soup, cheese / tuna sandwiches, a hot dish e.g., vegetable pasta or curry and fresh fruit.

Currently we are serving around 15 families and 20 individuals (approximately 60 – 80 people) but believe that as word of mouth spreads and the lighter nights and better weather comes, the numbers will increase. To reduce waste and to keep costs down, we encourage people to bring their own bags and containers. This is only partially successful, but we hope in time that this will improve.

The project has a team of 38 committed volunteers, all of whom required to complete a Food Hygiene Course which they funded themselves. Many but not all are Vincentians. Those that are also take on a befriending role. As trust has developed this has helped to identify further need and led to other assistance and support being offered.

Without a doubt the greatest strength of this project is its support from the volunteers and all the Conferences in the Glasgow NG. Those Conferences whose members cannot be there physically are providing other very valuable support e.g., financially and/or spiritually. And it is the latter which reminds us that'.... our work does not spring from ourselves alone.' Please remember our and all Vincentian projects in your prayers.

The Ozanam Club, Paisley was delighted to be able to come together to celebrate our 20th Anniversary in September 2022. We had a lovely Mass thanks to Fr Ryan (Black) our Curate at St Mirin's, Paisley. Attended by Club members, their families and support staff, our volunteer team and the wider Paisley Diocesan SSVP. We were especially pleased to welcome Bernie Parsons, one of our founding members, together with National President Danny Collins, Diocesan President Joe Hendry and friends from our (big) sister club (the Ozanam Club in Uddingston).

Not resting on our laurels we've been busy since then with a Halloween Party, a St Andrew's Ceilidh and a Christmas Party interspersed amongst regular club nights. We have big plans for 2023 too, which started with a Burns Supper on 27th January. Of course, none of this would be possible without the financial support of the Paisley Diocesan SSVP Conferences for which we are eternally grateful. **Our Lady of the Wayside, Paisley** continues their tremendous Vincentian work which includes operating a Soup Kitchen on a Friday evening, collecting & distributing basic food and toiletry provisions for parish clients within the Paisley Diocese as well as a new Lunch Club.

The 'Soup Kitchen' is held in the halls of Holy Trinity & Saint Barnabas (Episcopal) Church and is open to all adults regardless of denomination or faith. They operate an Open-Door policy, on a Friday evening 1845-1945, where clients can enjoy a hot three course meal in a safe, warm, and congenial atmosphere.

The 'Lunch Club' within the St Mirin's Cathedral halls, Incle St, Paisley, runs every second and fourth Monday of each calendar month 1330-1600. It has an Open-Door policy aimed at those who are sixty years or above though some younger people attend. Patrons enjoy Tea/Coffee/non-alcoholic beverages, wholesome hot soup and sandwiches as well as a quiz, bingo and other light entertainment. The 'Lunch Club' is a new venture and on a three-month pilot programme but is already proving very successful.

Brother Walfrid: A Forgotten Vincentian?



To those familiar with the name 'Brother Walfrid', most would likely associate the man with the foundation of Celtic Football Club in Glasgow in the late nineteenth century. Some might even point out that he was born in Ireland, his original name was Andrew Kerins or indeed that he was a Marist Brother. Very few, however, would be able to tell vou that Walfrid also served as a member of the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul (SSVP) until his dying day. It is an aspect of the spiritual journey of the life of one of the most influential and significant figures for the religious, social, and cultural life of modern Scotland that has - for too long - been overlooked. What better time to remember, reconsider and recognise Brother Walfrid as a Vincentian, than in the year of the 175th anniversary of the first SSVP conference being held in Glasgow?

Professor John S. Phillimore, 'the first Catholic professor in the University of Glasgow since the Reformation, stressed the strength of the St. Vincent de Paul Society (SSVP) in sustaining the Catholic community'. Local parish branches began springing up in Glasgow from 1848 onwards, just prior to Walfrid's arrival in the city as a fifteen-year-old in 1855. The SSVP, 'a powerful organ of Catholic Action', was of course founded by Blessed Frederic Ozanam. Ozanam was born in Milan in 1813 but interestingly raised, like his contemporary Saint Marcellin Champagnat who founded the Marist Brothers, in Lyon, France. The origins of two of the most important forums for Brother Walfrid's spiritual life - the SSVP and the Marist Brothers - can thus both be traced to Lyon in the southeast of France. Along with fellow Catholic students of history and philosophy at the Sorbonne, Paris, Blessed Ozanam held the first conference of the SSVP in May 1833. Two years later a Governing Council of the original collection of Brothers was created and 'the Rule' constituted. It read: 'The Rule defines the character of the Society - an association of piety and charity, having as object the visitation of the poor and being ready to adapt itself as far as possible to any further work, if of a truly charitable character'.

Just thirteen years after its foundation, the Society had spread from mainland Europe to Scotland when the "Francophile" Bishop Gillis of Edinburgh furnished the first Society with offices in 1846. James B. Bryson, a Glasgow solicitor, had joined Bishop Gillis' first Edinburgh branch of the SSVP during a two-year stay in Edinburgh. Upon his return to his native city in 1848, Bryson established the first Glasgow conference, St Andrew's, which was attached to the Cathedral parish by the river Clyde. Bryson had previously organised the foundation of the Scottish Catholic Temperance Association in 1839 and corresponded with the General Council in Paris to place the new Glasgow Conference on a sound footing. Between 1848 and 1858 - when the arrival of Irish people dispossessed by the Great Hunger, including a young Andrew Kerins, was peaking in Glasgow - the Society grew as a result to comprise 131 Brothers working in fourteen different community parishes. By 1898 - the fiftieth anniversary of the SSVP in Glasgow - the Society boasted 'forty-one conferences and 569 members. The Marist Brothers' spirit of Christian charity chimed with such endeavors. Sharing similar charism as well as distinctly French origins, the Marist teaching order and lay charitable organisation would foster close links in Glasgow, particularly.

The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul has of course been solemnly consecrated

to the Sacred Heart of Jesus from the 5th of February 1872. Just two years later, Brother Walfrid was entrusted, as headmaster, to open the new Sacred Heart school in Glasgow in 1874. By the 1880s, Walfrid had been promoted to Brother Superior of the Marist headquarters close to Glasgow Green. His influential position enabled him to initiate the 'Poor Children's Dinner Tables' charity in 1884 by enlisting the support of the local parish branches of the SSVP and fellow Marist Brother. Dorotheus. By providing basic meals in the Catholic schools of the area Brother Walfrid held the belief that he could ameliorate the impoverished situation of local children by encouraging engagement in education. Local collections were arranged by utilising the network of Vincentian branches to support the school feeding programme. Such examples of voluntary Catholic charity can be viewed as part of a distinct network of similar organised initiatives including childrens' refuge homes and industrial schools which also sprang up in Victorian Glasgow. In this sense, the vocation of the Brothers of Saint Vincent de Paul can be considered part of a wider progressive movement in British cities which allowed Catholics to take 'pride in the achievements of the group'.

The foundation of Celtic FC represented an extension of this 'communitybuilding': Brother Walfrid utilized football as a means of providing through the conferences of the SSVP for disadvantaged children attending local Catholic parish schools - most notably Sacred Heart of Bridgeton, Saint Mary's in the Calton and St Michael's of Parkhead. Walfrid's concern for the spiritual and physical welfare of 'the poor children' followed him to England post-Celtic when his works were required elsewhere by his religious superiors. In Spitalfields, in the impoverished east end of London, Brother Walfrid became influential in the weekly meetings of the Vincentian Brothers where he aimed to replicate and continue his charitable efforts alongside his duties as headmaster of the parish school. Particularly in the harsh winter months, fundraising efforts to provide free breakfasts - a scheme well ahead of its

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time - became vital to the young pupils under Walfrid's care. Over 80% were found to be relying on sustenance at St Anne's school at this time, with over 400 children receiving breakfast at school because of the funds raised by Brother Walfrid and his SSVP confreres. Feeding the poor children was indeed an issue close to his heart and can be traced back to Walfrid's formative years in famished Ireland. Charity and outreach, however, was not confined only to Catholics or indeed those from the surrounding urban area. In 1897, again perhaps moved by his own experience of the Great Hunger in Ireland, monies were collected and donated by Brother Walfrid's own SSVP

conference towards the 'Indian Famine Fund'. This reflected an international and universal dimension to the charitable conscience not only of Walfrid but of the Society to which he belonged.

Dr Michael Connolly completed his PhD at the University of Stirling in spring 2022, producing the first academic historical biography of Brother Walfrid, a Marist Brother and survivor of the Great Hunger in Ireland, who worked with impoverished communities in Glasgow and London in the latter half of the nineteenth century. Walfrid most famously utilised sport to synthesise education, charity, and community, in the form of Celtic Football Club in 1887.

A book based on this research was released by Argyll Publishing in early November 2022. "Walfrid: A Life of Faith, Community and Football" is available directly from the publisher online at www.thirstybooks.com or in-store at Celtic FC outlets in Scotland and Ireland.

I wish to thank our Scottish Conferences for the wonderful support we received after we highlighted the lack of money in the Project Fund. By February 2023 we received a total of £7,610 and we now have supported eleven Projects. These Projects are all to set up small self-help businesses for families. Some of these receive an interest free loan which will be paid back in a set time, then the money is used to help another family, or buying buffaloes for milk for their own consumption and selling, or setting up training for tailoring, or providing bikes to help children to access education. This has emptied the coffers of the Project Fund, therefore any other cash available would be very welcome.

The photograph is the result of a Fish Vending Project. These fishing nets were bought to free locals from having to pay to hire nets then having to sell their catch to the same company and if there was a poor catch be out of pocket, or even worse in debt, allowing them to set up their own little businesses. Please note: Any Conference who does not hear from their Twin and wishes me to try to improve the situation, please email me giving, your Conference name and code. I will try to get new information on your Twin.

At the moment I have two Conferences in South Africa who have applied for a Scottish Twin so if any Conference would like to have a new S.A. Twin then please let me know.

Who was Jules Gossin?

Auguste-Sébastien-Jules Gossin was born on 20 January 1789(59), in the town of Bar-le-Duc in France, 230 km from Paris. His parents were Pierre-François Gossin and Gabrielle Vayeur. Jules Gossin had four brothers: Gabriel, Henri Félicité, Joseph and Pierre-François. He graduated in law from the university of Paris on 1st August 1809, he then worked as a lawyer and magistrate throughout his professional life, including as a councillor to the appeal court in Paris. He wrote dozens of articles and legal texts, relating to the law but also on religious matters.
