

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

Publishing Policy

1. The objective is to publish a new Ozanam News, which will be issued three times per year, May, September and November. To facilitate this, a publications committee has been formed and a member of the National Council has been made responsible for its operation. The publications committee will normally meet two months before going to the printer. As at present, the actual putting together of the magazine will be the responsibility of the National Office staff, who will select the printer and liaise and coordinate with all preproduction functions. 2. In accordance with National Council requirements, the intention will be not to feature 'editorial' pieces. Any material deemed to detract from the Society's broader aims will be approved by the National Council prior to publication. Hopefully these arrangements will help the new Ozanam News develop into a more humorous, educational and spiritual publication which will concentrate on bringing the Society, its Members and Associates closer together. With this Togetherness in mind, National Council Agenda business could well become a regular feature in the magazine. In the main, letters for publication will normally be from twinning parties - regarded as reports. Other letters will be accepted for publication with an added footnote or returned for discussion by the respective council and/or president if thought to be more appropriate.

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

News from Social Justice Co-ordinator, Patricia McCartney



The main aims of the week are to:

- Highlight the reality of poverty and challenge the stereotypes that exist about it.
- Demonstrate what is being done across Scotland to address poverty.
- Increase public support for more action to solve

poverty.

Challenge Poverty Week is an opportunity for us as individuals and Vincentians to raise our voice against poverty and to show what is being done to tackle poverty across Scotland. Everyone is strongly encouraged to get involved by organising activities or by taking part in activities organised either with or by others.

Activities can include almost anything that helps raise awareness about poverty and demonstrates what can be done about it. Most of what we do as Vincentians fits the bill, so, getting behind this week is not a big ask.

The Poverty Alliance is asking that you let them know what you are doing so that they can promote it. Therefore registering any activity with them not only raises the profile of the SSVP in Scotland but also serves as a superb



'AYE we can' — that was the message on tackling poverty heard by hundreds of Vincentians at the St Vincent de Paul national meeting on Saturday September 1.

The meeting highlighted the incredible work of different SSVP conferences, councils and age groups from across Scotland.

Society members heard reports from Social Justice Co-ordinater Patricia McCartney, National Twinning Officer Ian Tierney, and a showcase on youth projects.

Peter Kelly, director of Poverty Alliance, was the keynote speaker on the day and explained why he believed that poverty could be eradicated in Scotland and how the SSVP can assist in that mission.

Mr Kelly began his talk by asking for a show of hands of those who believed that 'poverty will always be with us.' He will have his work cut out for him judging by the room of full pockets, but he optimistically asserted that poverty could be overcome.

"Poverty is something which we have created. Through our decisions as a society collectively, we have ended up with our current state of affairs. It needn't be that

way. There is much that we can

do," Mr Kelly said.
"A very simple message for us is that poverty can be solved by boosting people's incomes and by reducing their costs and I think when we put it in that way, it makes the task perhaps a little more simple than we imagine it to be."

The Poverty Alliance will be running Challenge Poverty Week from October 1-7, and as part of that event Mr Kelly highlighted three of their aims: to increase recognition that poverty exists in Scotland: to illustrate that, by boosting incomes and reducing people's costs, a lot can be done to tackle poverty; and to argue that 'solving poverty is also about allowing people to participate in society.

Mr Kelly noted that we treat the poor as 'the other, not us' and that we need to recognise our common humanity if we want to rid society of poverty.

He said that there are many areas in which the SSVP can help combat poverty, including housing, the attainment gap, foodbanks, payday loans, loneliness and isolation, work, and changes in

social security.

To really make a difference, he said, changes had to take place at the policy level to address child poverty, reduce the attainment gap and to ensure that those people who have a right to social security are having those rights fulfilled.

He also noted that at a local level St Vincent de Paul are already heavily involved with the fight against poverty, and he urged the society members to keep up their work in foodbanks, work he emphasised as 'really needed.'

SSVP members were also asked to look into Poverty Alliance Campaigns such as the Living Wage Campaign and the Give Me Five campaign to top-up child benefit.

Bishop Joseph Toal of Motherwell Diocese celebrated Mass at the conference and attended the entire day in support of the charitable organisation. The liturgy held in the auditorium of the Golden Jubilee Conference Hotel served as the spiritual foundation for a day of reflection and coming together to allow the society to move forward in its missionary endeavours.

Glasgow Archdiocesan Council announce project to help pupils

GLASGOW Archdiocesan Council have announced plans to pilot a project that will allow pupils in financial hardship to enter higher education. The project was announced in anticipation of the centenary year of the 1918 Education Act which celebrates the ways in which Catholic schools have been good not just for Catholics, but good for Scotland.

The Glasgow Council made the decision to initiate a project whereby pupils of Catholic schools in the Glasgow Archdiocese would be assisted financially to undertake further education at university. The project will be for the benefit of pupils who, because of financial hardship, would not be likely to embark on a university education.

The project, in its first year, has pulled together SSVP members, teachers and representatives of SCES to make the idea a reality. Drawing on different areas of expertise the Society members will rely confidently on the professional judgement of the teachers


who know the pupils best in the application process. This will allow pupils to demonstrate that they would be able to go to university if they were to be financially assisted.

The pilot year of the project will allow the Council to gauge how it can move forward. Mr Jim O'Hagan, Vice President of the Archdiocesan Council, said that the first year funding of 8 pupils will be used to ask 'many questions' about the number of pupils they could help in the future, what schools could be involved and how to progress if the pilot is a success.

The scheme is being piloted with 2 pupils from each of the following 4 schools in the academic year 2019/20:

- St. Andrew's Secondary, Carntyne
- St. Margaret Mary's Secondary, Castlemilk
- St. Mungo's' Academy, Gallowgate
- St. Paul's High School, Pollok.

For the pilot, the sum of £1,500 per successful



applicant will be payable in each year of their chosen degree course, dependent upon the applicant's acceptance onto the next year of the course. Payments will be in 3 stages, £700 prior to the start of the first term, and £400 prior to the start of the second and third terms.

Commenting on the idea behind the project Mr O'Hagan accepted the appeal to other Councils who might want to assist their young people in making a better future for themselves. "I wouldn't be surprised if other dioceses learning about it would be interested in it themselves. It would be nice to see if it could be a national endeavour," said Mr O'Hagan adding that the pilot will be a learning process for all involved.

O'Neill?

Who was Charles National President Jim McKendrick looks at the Glaswegian founder of Australia's Society

Charles Gordon O'Neill (1828-1900), engineer and Society member, was born in Glasgow. He trained as an engineer and graduated as a member of the Institution of Civil Engineers. For some time he was chief assistant in the Public Works Office, Glasgow. On graduation he joined the Society of St Vincent de Paul. He was Conference Secretary at Dumbarton in 1851 and by 1863 was the second President of the Superior Council of Glasgow and a member of the Council General in Paris.

He resigned in August 1863 and emigrated to New Zealand where he became in January 1864 surveyor to the Otago provincial government and later district engineer at Clutha in 1865. He became provincial engineer at Wellington. He planned and supervised the construction of Wellington's tramway system, and also the water-supply systems for the Otago goldfield and for Auckland.

In Wellington he was active in the Society of St Vincent de Paul and in 1876 founded its first conference to be aggregated in New Zealand. He is credited with establishing the Society in New Zealand. In 1881 O'Neill moved to Sydney and, with aid from the Marist Fathers, founded on 24 July the first Conference of the Society of St Vincent de Paul in Australia to be firmly established at St Patrick's, Church Hill. Recognised as head of the Society in Sydney, he became first President of the Particular Council of Sydney on 28 January 1884, and is widely regarded as the founder of the Society in Australia.

On the tenth anniversary of the founding of the Society of St Vincent de Paul in Australia O'Neill was presented with an illuminated address. Aged 72 O'Neill died in St Vincent's Hospital on 8 November 1900 and was buried in Rookwood cemetery, Sydney. In 1961 his remains were removed to the Society's burial plot for the destitute at Rookwood in company of those he served so well.

celebrated in November 2016 at the official opening of Charles O'Neill Memorial Walk at Rookwood Cemetery. Charles O'Neill Walk is positioned close to Charles' final resting place and provides a quiet contemplative place to pray and learn more about an extraordinary man who did so much for the people of Sydney in the late 19th century.

The opening of the Walk followed even more exciting news in the cause for canonisation of Charles O'Neill, Archbishop Anthony Fisher has accepted the cause and an

official committee has been formed to

progress it.

The celebrations finished in December with the Society's annual celebration Mass at St Patrick's Churchill, the home of the first St Vincent de Paul Society Conference. The Church features a stained glass window that was a gift from Charles O'Neill in recognition of the work of Blessed Frederic Ozanam. Outgoing President, Ray Reynolds, said "Charles O'Neill was a brilliant young visionary who was

torn between professional ambition and

a desire to follow the teachings of Jesus Christ to serve the poor. Charles sought a more authentic Christian model of charity, one that was unobtrusive, non-judgemental and respected the dignity of the poor. It is this vision we have proudly carried forward to this day".

Funding sent for four recent project applications:

Our Lady of Fatima, Badvel twinned with St Winin's, Killwinning.

Holy Family, Thumpottukonam twinned with St Patrick's, Coatbridge.

All Saints, Arayathurithy twinned with St Ninian's, Knightswood.

St Joseph's, Punaloor twinned with St Patrick's, Strathaven.

SADLY we are now in the position of no longer being able to fund further projects at present due to lack of funding. It is hoped that an appeal will be made for the Project fund in September.

Several Scottish Conferences have made a request for a South African Twin. South Africa has recently appointed a new Twinning Officer. In response - there are several Conferences that have indicated a desire for a twin but have not so far sent in an application form. Hopefully, twins will be provided in the future.

I receive from time to time requests from Conferences asking to be twinned with a particular country. It should be noted that any twinning links between countries have to be sanctioned by the Council General in Paris.

The Society in Scotland is already twinned with 3 countries, India, South Africa and Hungary. Most countries are already twinned with several others.

I draw your attention to the photo (above) we received from the Our Lady of Fatima Badvel Conference who had received funding to provide clothes for the poor in the surrounding areas. How gratifying to see that they were so happy to receive this funding that they took the trouble to publicise that they were able to do so through the help of Scottish Conferences!
